§ 1 Anwendungsbereich

Diese Studienordnung enthält die fachspezifischen Regelungen für den Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws. Sie gilt in Verbindung mit der fachspezifischen Prüfungsordnung für den Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws und der Fächerübergreifenden Satzung zur Regelung von Zulassung, Studium und Prüfung (ZSP-HU) in der jeweils geltenden Fassung.

§ 2 Beginn des Studiums

Das Studium kann zum Wintersemester aufgenommen werden.

§ 3 Ziele des Studiums

(1) Das Studium zielt auf die forschungsbasierte Vermittlung von grundständigem Wissen im Themenfeld des deutschen und europäischen Rechts sowie der forschungsbasierten Vermittlung von vertieftem und spezialisiertem Wissen in den Schwerpunktlinien ab. Das Studium dient dem Erwerb der Fähigkeit, dieses Wissen selbstständig anzuwenden und weiterzuentwickeln.

(2) Unterrichtssprache sowie Prüfungssprache ist die englische Sprache.

(3) Der erfolgreiche Abschluss des Studiums bietet eine Zusatzqualifikation für eine berufliche Tätigkeit in Rechtsanwaltskanzleien, Unternehmen, der Verwaltung oder der Wissenschaft im In- und Ausland.

§ 4 Module des Studiums

Der Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws beinhaltet folgende Module im Umfang von insgesamt 60 LP:

(a) Pflichtbereich (45 LP)

- LLM 1: Introduction into European and German Law (10 LP)
- LLM 2a: Legal theory and legal reasoning (5 LP)
- LLM 2b: Academic writing and jurisprudence (10 LP)
- LLM 3: Research perspectives in Justice & Security, Law & Society, Innovation & Transformation (5 LP)
- LLM 5: Master Thesis (15 LP)

(b) Fachlicher Wahlpflichtbereich (15 LP)

- LLM 4a: Profile: Justice & Security (15 LP)
- LLM 4b: Profile: Law & Society (15 LP)
- LLM 4c: Profile: Innovation & Transformation (15 LP)
- LLM 4d: Profile: General (15 LP)

In den Wahlpflichtbereichen 4a, 4b und 4c müssen jeweils mindestens drei Veranstaltungen aus dem entsprechenden Profil belegt werden. Eine vierte Veranstaltung kann aus einem beliebigen Profil gewählt werden. Um den Wahlpflichtbereich LLM 4d zu belegen sind vier beliebige Kurse der Bereiche LLM 4a-c zu belegen, jedoch nicht mehr als zwei Kurse pro Profil.

LLM 1: Introduction into European and German Law

Learning objectives: The module introduces the students to the fundamental principles of European and German law. The module covers the multi-level structure of the European and German legal system in its international context and compares it to other legal systems. The acquired basic knowledge is deepened in the core areas of private, public and criminal law.			
The students shall: – Learn about the legal institutions, sources and actors at the different levels of the European and German legal system – Become familiar with the fundamental principles of European and German private, public and criminal law – Understand the European and German social model and historical roots reflected in the legal principles – Be able to evaluate and critically analyze the legal principles of European and German law in a comparative perspective.

Learning objectives: The module is concerned with current global challenges to justice and security, such as war, terrorism, climate change, societies in transition and authoritarian rule. It explores the existing legal frameworks and also asks how the law can respond to these current challenges. In addition to more theoretical and doctrinal perspectives, the module incorporates historical angles and practitioner views. The lectures and seminars cover a variety of fields, including international criminal law, international peace and security law, international humanitarian law, transitional justice, and human rights law. The students: – Become familiar with international criminal law, international peace and security law, international humanitarian law and other relevant areas of law – Can recognize and critically evaluate their impact on justice and security – Understand the interplay of legal sources, institutions and actors at the international, European and national level.

LLM 4b: Profile: Law & Society			Credit Points: 15 Total workload: 375 hours
Learning objectives: The module is concerned with current legal challenges in the context of law and society as a field of interdisciplinary legal studies. Doctrinal legal research is complemented by social sciences, critically reflecting the opaque separation of knowledge by different academic disciplines. By this interdisciplinary approach, functions and interdependencies of law are examined in an integrative and methodologically reflected way. The lectures and seminars cover a variety of fields, including interdisciplinary research on law (theories, methods and challenges), law in societies and law in history, law-making and adjudication in fields such as migration law, law beyond borders, including the role of human rights in different legal contexts, such as asylum and refugee law. In addition to more theoretical and doctrinal perspectives, the module incorporates historical angles and practitioner views. The students: – Become familiar with the different research areas of law & society, including international human rights and refugee law, European migration law and other relevant areas of law – Can recognize and critically evaluate their impact on law and society – Understand the interplay of legal sources, institutions and actors at the international, European and national level.

§ 1 Anwendungsbereich

Sie gilt in Verbindung mit der fachspezifischen Studienordnung für den Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws und der Fächerübergreifenden Satzung zur Regelung von Zulassung, Studium und Prüfung (ZSP-HU) in der jeweils geltenden Fassung.

§ 2 Regelstudienzeit

Der weiterbildende Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws hat eine Regelstudienzeit von zwei Semestern.

§ 3 Prüfungsausschuss

Für die Prüfungsangelegenheiten des weiterbildenden Masterstudienganges Humboldt Master of Laws ist der Prüfungsausschuss der Juristischen Fakultät zuständig.

§ 4 Masterarbeit

(1) Die Bearbeitungszeit der Masterarbeit beträgt ab der verbindlichen Themenvergabe 16 Wochen. Die Arbeit soll einen Umfang von 100.000 Zeichen (ohne Leerzeichen) nicht überschreiten.

(2) Bestandene Masterarbeiten sind zu verteidigen. Die Verteidigung hat einen Umfang von 20 Minuten.

§ 5 Abschlussnote

(1) Die Abschlussnote des weiterbildenden Masterstudienganges Humboldt Master of Laws wird aus den Noten der Modulabschlussprüfungen und der Note der Masterarbeit, gewichtet nach den gemäß der Anlage für die Module und die Masterarbeit ausgewiesenen Leistungspunkten, berechnet.

(2) Modulabschlussprüfungen, die nicht benotet werden oder im Rahmen einer Anrechnung mangels vergleichbarer Notensysteme lediglich als „bestanden“ ausgewiesen werden, sowie die für die entsprechenden Module ausgewiesenen Leistungspunkte werden bei den Berechnungen nach Abs. 1 nicht berücksichtigt.

§ 6 Studienabschluss

Für einen Masterabschluss sind unter Einbeziehung des ersten berufsqualifizierenden Hochschulabschlusses in der Regel 300 Leistungspunkte erforderlich. Davon kann bei entsprechender Qualifikation der Studentinnen und Studenten im Einzelfall abgewichen werden.

§ 7 Akademischer Grad

Wer den weiterbildenden Masterstudiengang Humboldt Master of Laws erfolgreich abgeschlossen hat, erlangt den akademischen Grad „Master of Laws“ (abgekürzt LL.M.).
